SECTION 2 – ACADEMIC DETAILS

Subject Rationale

This subject comprises in-class case-based discussions, and also clinical placement within the Endeavour clinical practice facilities. Classroom case-based discussion provides students the opportunity to observe acupuncturists providing consultations to a range of clients and clinical presentations within a facilitated tutorial, develop an appreciation of the steps utilised in clinical reasoning and decision making, and the formulation of point prescriptions and treatment plans incorporating a range of acupuncture and Chinese medicine theories. Students will engage in interview and diagnostic processes to combine traditional theories and practices, evidence-based knowledge, personal experience, and client input to inform their clinical decisions and reflect upon their own performance. Students will also consolidate their practical skills application through the reproduction of acupuncture therapies, Chinese remedial massage (tui na) and Chinese lifestyle therapies as developed for model patients, adherence to clinical procedures and professional requirements, and act as clinical assistants, preparing them for future clinical placements as a senior student practitioner.

Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate professional, collaborative, ethical and safe behaviours, including communication, the administration of clinical processes and equipment, risk and quality management, and adherence to professional and legal responsibilities.
- 2. Perform an interview and health assessment incorporating diagnostic assessments, and findings from further investigations.
- 3. Categorise patient presentations and treatment responses within Chinese medicine frameworks, with an awareness of own scope of practice.
- 4. Identify appropriate prescriptions and treatment plans that are described by classical, clinical, or research-based literature, incorporating a range of acupuncture and Chinese medicine theories and integrating patients' informed consent.
- 5. Utilise Chinese medicine health interventions including acupuncture therapies, Chinese remedial massage, and Chinese lifestyle therapies in a physically and culturally safe manner under supervision.
- 6. Monitor own performance, including through the use of reflection and feedback from supervisors, patients and peers.
