SECTION 2 – ACADEMIC DETAILS

Subject Rationale

Clinical interns practise homeopathic medicine under the supervision of qualified practitioners in the Endeavour Teaching Clinics, by taking a shared role in client assessment and care in partnership with another practicing student. Practical application of holistic medicine clinical skills such as history-taking, education of the client about homeopathic medicine and the general course of treatment, holistic medicine assessment techniques, pathology testing and conventional physical examination techniques, guide the intern in actively participating in the development of an individual treatment plan. Background research on each client's condition and evidence—informed treatment options is conducted by the intern between client visits. Interns apply holistic medicine theory and principles in case management of patients with diverse clinical presentations.

Learning Outcomes

- 1. Display appropriate professionalism while maintaining a therapeutic relationship with the client.
- 2. Conduct homeopathic consultations to elicit clinical data essential to determining appropriate client management strategies.
- 3. Apply homeopathic philosophy, principles, ethical and professional values, knowledge and skills to the assessment and management of clients in a clinical setting.
- 4. Evaluate diagnostic and treatment options along with relevant research, clinical experience, cultural considerations and patient preferences to construct a suitable and effective treatment plan.
- 5. Apply knowledge of homeopathic practice management including Work Health and Safety standards, office reception, clinic procedures, dispensing, and homeopathic treatment.

- In Clinical Practicum students are evaluated on their ability to apply their knowledge and skills in a professional manner. Therefore students should note that, although helpful, previous success in academic subjects does not guarantee success in Clinical Practicum.
- During this Clinical Practicum, students will practice under supervision either singly or in pairs:
 - Onducting clinical consultations and observations
 - Practitioner-client communication
 - O Case taking
 - Olinical examination skills
 - O Interpretation of biomedical and functional test results
 - Differential diagnosis
 - Developing individualised treatment plans
 - Appropriate referral
 - O Presentation to Supervisor and obtaining approval for treatment plan
 - Office management skills, dispensing and reception duties
 - Observing all clinic policies and procedures
 - Participating in debriefing sessions at the conclusion of each clinical practicum to identify any important issues.

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
